4. **Monitoring & Reporting of the project under each programme** - The monitoring of the CSR Activities may be undertaken in the form of periodical review, field visit, third party audit or certification, periodical reports etc. The CSR Committee shall review the progress on Annual Action Plan preferably on quarterly basis but not less than twice in a year.
5. The Board shall review the status of implementation and fund utilization of the various projects and programmes as per approved Annual Action Plan at least once in a year.
6. The Company may take up additional projects other than those stated above, with the approval of the Board from time to time.

7. **Impact Assessment** will be undertaken in accordance with rule 8(3)(a) of Corporate Social Responsibility Rules, 2014 (as amended from time to time) for all those projects having outlays of one crore rupees or more, and which have been completed one year or more, based on actual spends made on the individual projects.
